### Our Mission Statement

Welcome to our 12th year of homeschool enrichment!

The following pages spell out the co-op in detail. It is important that you read this packet thoroughly. Upon understanding how we function and what your responsibilities will be, you can determine whether this is a good fit for you and your family.

Legacy is designed to offer homeschool enrichment electives to parents who are homeschooling in the state of Washington under the Home-Based Instruction law, RCW 28A.200.010. We meet Thursdays, September through June (see schedule for specific dates), at Overlake Christian Church, located at 9900 Willows Rd. NE, Redmond, WA.

The instructors determine the course content, materials, and cost of each class. All instructors are required to sign and be in agreement with our Statement of Faith and Mission Statement (available upon request). Parents are welcome and highly encouraged to attend classes with their children.

Legacy Homeschool Center does not employ instructors. They are under the employ of the families who have a student attending his/her class. For this reason, we do not pay the teachers; you, the parents, pay the teachers directly through a facilitator. The Board does, however, maintain supervisory authority. School District funds may not be used to pay for tuition, fees, and/or registration, or for the reimbursement thereof.

We cannot guarantee you will get the class(es) you request; however, each full class will maintain a waiting list.

All parents are required to:

- ◆ Fulfill an assigned job, and be available to provide additional assistance if needed.
- ◆ Remain within Legacy boundaries the entire time your children are at Legacy.
- ◆ Pay tuition for classes on time.
- ◆ Submit a copy of the declaration of intent to homeschool for each child in your family over 8 years who is attending Legacy.

*Failure to fulfill these requirements will jeopardize your privilege to participate in this co-op.*

## **Parent Responsibilities & Expectations 2009-2010**

1. Dropping off your children or sending them with another Legacy family is **not allowed**. You are required to stay at Legacy Homeschool Center with your children every Thursday. Sitting in your car during Legacy hours is not allowed.
2. Remain within the designated co-op boundaries of the church. **DO NOT use areas of the church that OCC has not invited Legacy to use. EMPTY CLASSROOMS, THE GYM, THE CHAPEL, THIRD FLOOR, AND STAIRWELLS ARE OFF LIMITS, unless you are in class, traveling to or from class, or exiting the building in the case of an emergency.**
3. You will be assigned a janitorial, setup, cleanup/restoration, monitoring, or facilitating job. Families with students enrolled in classes at the beginning or end of the day need to plan on helping with setup or restoration. If you are assigned a restoration job at the end of the day, please understand that your responsibilities may extend past the end of class time.

**Each week, you are responsible to do your job, as well as be available and willing to help out in other areas when needed.** If you are unable to fulfill your assigned job due to an absence, it is **YOUR** responsibility to find a replacement so that your job will be completed. You will be contacted, prior to classes starting, concerning your job.

4. Co-op participation is contingent upon tuition being paid on time. Please pay class facilitators according to the co-op Payment Schedule. Tuition and fees for classes are **non-refundable**, including any tuition paid in advance.
5. Please register your children in their classes with the intention to participate from September to June. If you choose to drop a class, you will be required to pay an early withdrawal penalty equal to four weeks of tuition from the date that you give notice to the facilitator.
6. In order for your child to get the maximum benefit out of their classes, please plan to attend class with them as often as possible. It is critical that arrangements be made for siblings not enrolled in class. Siblings will not be allowed to attend classes in which they are not registered and will be asked to leave.
7. Cell phone use is not allowed during class; this includes text messaging. Please turn off cell phones during class.
8. Students are expected to be prepared for class with completed assignments and all required books and materials.
9. You assume full responsibility for your children at all times while at Legacy. This includes, but is not limited to, the time they spend in study hall.
10. Parents will be contacted if a disciplinary problem arises.
11. Parents and students are to follow the dress and conduct codes listed on page 3.
12. Sick/contagious family members/students may not attend Legacy.
13. A **non-refundable** \$110.00 per family registration/building use fee is expected at the time of registration. You will be signing your agreement to abide by these policies on your family Registration Contract, which is included in this packet.
14. As a cooperative organization, all parents are responsible to enforce co-op rules and expectations.

## **Student Responsibilities & Expectations 2009-2010**

**Parents need to review these with their child(ren) prior to the first class.**

1. Treat teachers, parents, other students, and our host facility/staff courteously and with respect at all times.
2. Be in class, in the lunchroom or in the study hall at all times while at Legacy Homeschool Center. Do not loiter in the hallways.
3. Remain within the designated co-op boundaries of the church. **DO NOT use areas of the church that OCC has not invited Legacy to use. EMPTY CLASSROOMS, THE GYM, THE CHAPEL, THIRD FLOOR, AND STAIRWELLS ARE OFF LIMITS, unless you are in class, traveling to or from class, or exiting the building in the case of an emergency.**
4. Do not run or talk loudly while walking to and from your classes.
5. Arrive five minutes before class begins, but no more than ten minutes early.
6. Come to class prepared with completed assignments and all required books and materials.
7. Cell phone use is not allowed during class; this includes text messaging. Please turn off cell phones during class. If the teacher or facilitator is aware of any student using a cell phone in class, they may choose to confiscate the phone until the end of class.
8. Please honor all OCC signs denoting where food and drinks are allowed. Eating will not be permitted in the classrooms at any time, unless scheduled by the teacher. **It is your responsibility to clean up after yourselves.** NW1 is available for snacks and is the designated area for lunch.
9. When in study hall, please be quiet and courteous of other students or families completing their work.
10. No bikes, skateboards, or roller blades allowed on church premises.
11. No pets are allowed on church premises (including the parking lot) except working service dogs.
12. No weapons [guns, knives (real or play), etc.], alcohol, or illegal drugs will be permitted on church premises.
13. DRESS CODE and CONDUCT CODE:
  - Clothing should be modest.
  - Hemlines should be at least knee-length.
  - Bare midribs, halter tops, spaghetti straps and/or visible cleavage are unacceptable.
  - Underclothing should not be visible.
  - Shoes and shirts are required at all times, both outside and in the building.
  - Walking shorts only.
  - Inappropriate physical affection and/or aggression will not be tolerated.
  - Foul language and/or bullying will not be tolerated.

## Registration Procedures for 2009 – 2010

### To register for the 2009-2010 academic year:

Please check off the following items to ensure that you complete registration thoroughly and accurately:

- \_\_\_ 1) Read the entire registration packet to determine whether Legacy is a good fit for your family.
- \_\_\_ 2) Determine whether your children are being homeschooled according to the Home-Based Instruction law, RCW 28A.200.010. For more information, please visit the WHO web site at [www.washhomeschool.org](http://www.washhomeschool.org).
- \_\_\_ 3) Complete and sign the *Registration Contract*. The contract must be signed by the parents, and any students born prior to **5/31/97**.
- \_\_\_ 4) Complete a *Registration Form* for each student you would like to enroll (one child per form).
- \_\_\_ 5) Write a check for \$110.00, made payable to **Legacy Homeschool Center**, to cover the registration/building use fee. This fee is non-refundable.
- \_\_\_ 6) Make a photocopy of the registration contract for your records.
- \_\_\_ 7) Bring your completed *Registration Contract*, class *Registration Form(s)*, and your registration/building use fee to Legacy on the assigned registration day:

If you are a **returning family**, register on: 4/2/09, 10:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m.

If you are a **new family**, register on: 4/9/09, 10:00 a.m. – 12:00 noon.

### Late Registration Procedures – BEGINNING 5/22/09 – 6/4/09 and resuming 9/10/09:

1. Read the entire registration packet to determine whether Legacy is a good fit for your family.
2. Determine whether your children are being homeschooled according to the Home-Based Instruction law, RCW 28A.200.010. For more information, please visit the WHO web site at [www.washhomeschool.org](http://www.washhomeschool.org).
3. Call the facilitator for each class you have selected to see if there is an opening.
  - ◆ If there is no opening, you may request to be put on a waiting list. You will be notified if/when an opening occurs.
  - ◆ If there is an opening:
    - ◆ Provide the appropriate tuition and fee checks (payable to the teacher) to the facilitator within one week of notification. If not received within one week, the opening will be offered to another student.
4. Complete and sign the *Registration Contract*. The contract must be signed by the parents, and any students born prior to **5/31/97**.
5. Write a check for \$110.00, made payable to **Legacy Homeschool Center**, to cover the registration/building use fee. This fee is non-refundable.
6. Make a photocopy of the registration contract for your records.
7. Bring the *Registration Contract* and your registration/building use fee to Legacy by **6/4/09** or after **9/10/09**.

**REGISTRATION IS CLOSED BETWEEN 6/5/09 and 9/9/09.**

## Registration Procedures for 2009 – 2010 (Continued)

### After Registration:

- 4/16/09 **For returning families ONLY (registered before 1/31/09 and actively participating in Legacy):** Preliminary class lists from Returning Family registrations will be posted at OCC.
- 4/30/09 **For returning families ONLY:** ADD/DROP day. Returning families may add or drop classes on this day only (by random selection). Before adding a class during an hour for which you hold a confirmed spot, you must drop the confirmed class spot. You may NOT hold a confirmed spot and be on a class waiting list for the same hour.
- 5/21/09 **For all families:** Final class lists for all students will be posted. Pick up your individualized family class schedule and facilitator list. Register your children for any non-instructional rooms, i.e., nursery and study hall.
- 5/21/09 **Facilitator training session.** If you are assigned to facilitate a class, you **must** attend this training.
- 5/28/09 **For all families:** Provide **two non-refundable checks** payable to the teacher (one for supply fees, post-dated\* 7/1/09; the second for September tuition, post-dated\* 9/10/09) to the designated facilitator. Your checks secure your student(s) enrollment in class. Any unsecured spots as of 5/21/09 will be offered to students on the waiting list.
- 9/17/08 On or before 9/17/08, provide Legacy with a photocopy of your declaration of intent to homeschool.

### IMPORTANT NOTES FOR RETURNING AND NEW FAMILY REGISTRATION:

- ◆ Please make your selections carefully. Once class forms, registration contracts, and registration fees have been processed, **your registration is final. NO further changes, additions, etc., can be made until add/drop day.**
- ◆ **You may only register your child for classes that are listed within your child's grade limit.** If your child is outside the grade range for a class that you would like to register him/her for, you must have the teacher fill out a permission slip, and **wait until add/drop day** to add that class.
- ◆ If you will be out of town on registration day, please be sure to do one of the following:
  - Bring your registration paperwork and check to the registrar before leaving town,
  - Have a friend turn in your registration paperwork and check for you on registration day, or
  - Send your registration paperwork and check to P.O. Box 3325, Redmond, WA 98073-3325, postmarked no later than March 31, 2009.
- ◆ Check the bulletin board for class updates prior to registration; changes may occur after printing of this packet.
- ◆ Students' names will be randomly selected to fill classes and waiting lists. Legacy reserves the right to prioritize enrollment of upperclassmen.

### IMPORTANT NOTES FOR ALL FAMILIES:

- ◆ When you sign your child up for a class, please do so **with the intention of having your child remain in class for the entire year.** We understand there are situations that make it necessary to drop a class mid-year; however, please keep in mind that this may have a negative impact on the teacher and other students in the class.
- ◆ Please understand that **all tuition and fees are non-refundable.** This includes all tuition and fees that you pay over the summer and tuition that you choose to pay ahead during the school year.
- ◆ When dropping class(es) after 5/21/09, please notify appropriate class facilitator(s) so a waiting student can take your student's vacated spot. **If you are dropping Legacy entirely, PLEASE notify the Registration Director in addition to notifying the facilitator for each class.**
- ◆ If you choose to drop a class, you will be required to pay an early withdrawal penalty equal to four weeks of tuition from the date that you give notice to the facilitator.
- ◆ **Failure to provide a copy of your declaration of intent by the date listed above will jeopardize your privilege to participate in this co-op.**

\* Post-dated checks: Every attempt will be made to hold these checks until dated; however, in the event they are deposited earlier, your bank will honor these checks and cash them. To avoid overdraft fees, make sure you have the money in your account to cover these checks.

## **Legacy General Policies & Information 2009-2010**

### **Information Center**

There will be an information table in front of the Chapel with a mailbox folder for every co-op family. A bulletin board for class openings and general Legacy information will also be posted nearby. Please check this area weekly for any updates and news concerning Legacy Homeschool Center.

### **Bulletin Board Policy/Disclaimer**

The bulletin board is available for notification and communication of homeschool information among co-op participants. Items included on the bulletin board do not necessarily constitute co-op board endorsement or promotion. As a non-profit organization, we are prohibited by law from the "carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation," neither shall we "participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office."

### **Mailbox Policy**

Mailboxes are a convenience for co-op participants to communicate co-op related information and to distribute tuition checks and other approved literature. Mailboxes are not to be used for solicitation. Please check with the Board before distribution of material via the mailboxes. Legacy Homeschool Center is not responsible for the loss of any property distributed through or left in mailboxes. Each mailbox will contain a current family schedule (parent maintained) to assist in locating parents/students as needed.

### **Emergency Procedures**

In case of a fire, alarms will sound and all children should be evacuated along assigned routes to safe areas away from the building. Keep children as calm and quiet as possible. Move quickly, but do not run or allow children to run. All exits are clearly marked, and emergency exit routes are shown on wall maps in each room. All classes need to remain together with their teacher and facilitator. An OCC staff member will notify teachers and facilitators when it is safe to re-enter the building. Should we be unable to enter the building again, teachers and facilitators will need to remain with their classes until parents locate their children. In the event of an earthquake, everyone should immediately go under a table and assume the duck and cover position. It is important that you stay away from any windows and remain in the room until given further instructions. \*In the event of a non-evacuation emergency, please listen for complete instructions. We will have unannounced emergency drills throughout the year.

### **Hall Passes**

In order to adequately account for each student during an emergency, Legacy requires that all students, if they are unaccompanied by a parent, remain in class or study hall unless a hall pass has been issued from one of these locations.

### **Lunch**

NW1 is the designated area for lunch. We encourage each family to eat together. Each parent is responsible to make sure his/her children clean up after themselves.

### **Nursery Information**

Please see the Nursery Coordinator for nursery policy details.

### **Winter Weather Closure Policy**

In case of inclement weather, check the Legacy web site at [www.legacyhc.org](http://www.legacyhc.org) for closure information.

### **Class Cancellations**

Classes may be cancelled at any time at the Board's discretion. If class is cancelled due to teacher's absence, children may be sent to the study hall. In the event of class cancellation/teacher absence, reasonable effort will be made to notify parents prior to class time. Teachers work many hours outside the classroom; therefore, if class(es) are cancelled, tuition will not be refunded.

### **Emergency Contact**

We are independent of the church's operation and ask that you not call OCC regarding co-op matters. Please address all inquiries to Board members.

### **Auditing Classes**

Parent/student auditing (attending without paying tuition) is not permitted. Only students enrolled in the class and their parents are eligible to attend class. Parents are not eligible to enroll in a class.

**Text:** Biology with Laboratory Exercises for Christian Schools; BJUP, 3rd Edition (vol. A & B).

**Prerequisites:** Completion of Physical Science with minimum grade of B.

**Description:** This course provides a more advanced approach to Biology as the first semester focuses on biochemistry, microbiology, and biotechnology. The second half of the course does include the familiar topics of botany, zoology, and human anatomy. College format for lab reports will be taught. Class time includes weekly quizzes, multimedia enhanced lectures, and a lab which reinforces the topic. While lectures are presented to introduce the material, students are expected to learn the text material at home to facilitate labs during class. Biochemistry and microbiology labs include: DNA extraction, gel electrophoresis (DNA fingerprinting), transformation of bacterial DNA, and use of microscopes for cytology and microbiology. Zoology labs include skeletal remains identification, eye, heart, and brain dissections, as well as invertebrate, frog, and fetal pig dissections. Most labs are conducted individually or in pairs – equipment and microscopes have a maximum of two students. Homework will take 4-8 hours per week - no late work accepted - students must maintain a passing grade to remain in class.

### Digital Video and Film – Kurt Glaser

**Grade:** 7 - 12

**Class Size:** 7 to 40

**Cost:** \$25 monthly, \$20 materials

**Text:** Instructor handouts example; film glossary.

**Prerequisites:** A passion for movies and film that speak truth.

**Description:** The class objective and purpose is to provide a learning environment that is both very challenging and at the same time enjoyable and highly interactive within the milieu of a film and video program of study. Classes will start out with a lecture series explaining the art and science of digital video and film, jingles, podcasting, equipment, gear, lighting, computers in filmmaking, storyboarding, and script writing. We will then embark on a hands-on approach from writing and producing commercials to a short film, to be viewed by the teachers and student body of Legacy at a "Premier." Assessment will be by numerous testing methodologies with an average amount of homework. Bypassing prerequisites determined on an individual basis by teacher. No book, but numerous handouts & some guest lectures. This will be a very dynamic class with extensive teacher/student interaction and teamwork necessary. Possible entry of short film into various Christian independent film contests.

### High School Chemistry – Katy Erickson

**Grade:** 10 - 12

**Class Size:** 12 to 16

**Cost:** \$40 monthly, \$80 materials

**Text:** Exploring Creation with Chemistry, 2nd edition-- Apologia.

**Prerequisites:** Algebra.

**Description:** The study of chemistry provides insight into how intricately God designed our world. This course will study the basic principles of chemistry, including the periodic table, stoichiometry, chemical reactions, and atomic structure. Class sessions will include some lecture, review of problems, and most importantly lab activities. Students will be expected to complete bookwork and practice problems at home in order to reserve class time for labs. Students must have adequate skills in basic algebra. We will have tests over each module, and students will be required to complete a basic lab report for labs. Students should expect to spend 30 minutes to one hour per day on homework. The text for this course is Exploring Creation with Chemistry, 2nd ed., available at [www.apologia.com](http://www.apologia.com). Students must provide their own textbook. All other materials, including lab equipment, are included in the materials fee. 9th graders with strong math skills and a background in algebra may be enrolled.

### Latin HS II/III – Deborah Langley

**Grade:** 10 - 12

**Class Size:** 8 to 22

**Cost:** \$18 monthly, \$20 materials

**Text:** Wheelock's 6th ed. revised; Workbook for Wheelock's Latin 3rd ed. revised; English Grammar for Students of Latin; 501 Latin Verbs; Comprehensive Guide to Wheelock's Latin; plus readers: II – 38 Latin Stories; III – Duces Romanorum, Love Poetry.

**Prerequisites:** Latin HS I/Latin HS II, respectively.

**Description:** Latin HS II/III will be a one and one half hour class which will include 45 minutes of teacher instruction time and 45 minutes of supervised translation lab work with TAs. Level II will be considerably more aggressive than Latin HS I. Students should be prepared to do 6-7 hours of homework a week. We will work through 23 chapters of Wheelock's Latin. Level III will take Latin enthusiasts through Wheelock's chapters 24-40. This aggressive completion of Wheelock's will be followed by in-class and at-home translations of classical Latin excerpts of prose and poetry. Students should be prepared to do 6-7 hours of homework a week. Students of both Latin HS II and III will be encouraged to take the National Latin Exam in March, and preparation for the exam will be part of the course study including assigned reports. Students should purchase required texts and books, and complete the first lesson prior to the first class. Complete text lists and first assignment will be supplied by the teacher following registration.

With a full year to explore one medium, the student can gain a good grasp of working with the tools. **Class Size:** 10 to 25

**Cost:** \$25 monthly, \$25 materials

**Description:** Academic writing is a skill every student needs to be successful in college and effective in life. This course has three goals: to teach students how to systematically write a basic five paragraph essay; to supply them with tips to improve their writing; and to give them practice through a variety of assignments. Sadly, though, many believers treat the Bible as a stagnant pool fit only for ivory tower theologians to drink from. Despite the confusion, intimidation, and boredom we feel at times when we come to Scripture, every Christian has the responsibility to hide God's wonderful Word in their heart. By "re-viewing" familiar passages and wrestling with those troublesome sections that are often kept at a safe distance, students will learn the essential principles for reading, interpreting, and applying the Bible correctly and consistently. Students should expect 1-2 hours of homework per week (including Bible reading, cultural research, and writing papers), and will need access to some Bible reference materials.**Navigating the Culture of Naturalism (I Object) – Steve Carrier****Grade:** 9 - 12**Class Size:** 12 to 24**Cost:** \$20 monthly, \$2.5 materials**Text:** Teacher provided.**Prerequisites:** None.**Description:** Formerly titled I OBJECT, this class explores the current dominant culture of Naturalism (secular materialism) and associated evolutionary studies.

Students learn the foundational arguments of the naturalistic culture, and more importantly, the student learns how to answer these arguments using disciplined science and logic. Creation Science is emphasized, and students are introduced to that place where physics meets metaphysics, where we discover the imprint of creation in the natural realm.

There will be two mid-terms and a final; however testing is not emphasized as much as participation.

The titles we read will vary each year, but possibilities and past works include: The Adventures of Tom Sawyer, Roll of Thunder, Hear My Cry, To Kill a Mockingbird, Anne Frank: The Diary of a Young Girl, The Hound of the Baskervilles, The Prince and the Pauper, and various short stories, and poems.**Shurley Grammar 3rd - 4th – Teresa Olsen****Grade:** 3 - 5**Class Size:** 12 to 23**Cost:** \$20 monthly, \$30 materials**Text:** Shurley Grammar Level 4 - Teacher to provide.**Prerequisites:** Student must be a strong reader.**Description:** A solid understanding of grammar is useful for improving writing skills and learning a foreign language. Shurley Grammar is an extremely effective program for the acquisition and retention of grammar concepts. Chants and jingles are used to learn the parts of speech, their function, and how to locate them in a sentence. Punctuation, capitalization, editing, synonyms/antonyms, etc. will also be covered. Grammar is often dry and boring, but this program adds fun to the memorization and application of the concepts. Parental attendance is encouraged, especially for the first 3 - 4 weeks of class. Students can expect 15 - 30 minutes of daily homework.**Storytelling/Book Report Adventures – Rita Rothlisberger****Grade:** 5 - 7**Class Size:** 7 to 22**Cost:** \$20 monthly, \$25 materials**Text:** Books chosen from provided booklist.**Prerequisites:** None.**Description:** Does writing a book report leave a dry hack in the back of your mouth? Do your children sit, eyes glazed over, stupefied with book reportitis? This fun and interactive class will combine elements of drama and storytelling to enhance written and oral book reports. Yes, we will still write book reports, but hopefully we can creatively spark imagination, and enhance retention and understanding through incorporating elements of drama, storytelling/writing, role-playing, visual aids, and props. **Class Size:** 8 to 12

**Cost:** \$25 monthly, \$30 materials

**Text:** None.

**Prerequisites:** Run/jog 1 mile without stopping, and perform 10 pushups and 10 situps.

**Description:** To improve aerobic capacity, muscular strength, endurance, and flexibility. Aerobic conditioning will primarily be done by outdoor running; muscular strength will be achieved through weight training and floor exercises. Muscular and cardiovascular endurance will be increased through supersetting and circuit type training. Flexibility will be enhanced through a series of active and static stretching. It is strongly recommended that students perform aerobic and resistance type training an additional 3-4 days per week to achieve optimal results and to prevent injury. **Class Size:** 12 to 20

**Cost:** \$24 monthly, \$15 materials

**Text:** WriteShop II By Kim Kautzer & Debra Oldar. Parents purchase: WriteShop II student binder and a small box of colored pencils.

**Prerequisites:** None.

**Description:** The primary text for this course will be part II of the WriteShop program. It is not necessary to have completed WriteShop I in order to take this class, but students should have some formal writing background. WriteShop is an incremental writing program which focuses on descriptive, narrative, and persuasive writing. It also includes outlining, point-of-view writing, compare and contrast essays, and timed essays. In addition to this text, teacher provided resources will be used to sharpen various writing skills. **Description:** This is a challenging Algebra I course that lays the foundation for all higher mathematics. It provides the mathematical understanding to operate with concepts at an abstract level. Topics covered are: algebraic expressions and equations, negative numbers, the quadratic equation, inequalities, polynomials, exponents, radicals, and quadratics. It has the normal content of a first-year high school algebra. Successful completion of this sequence prepares students for high school Geometry or Algebra II.

Student should have a solid understanding of the concepts covered in pre-algebra before taking this class.

Expect 5-6 hours coursework per week including daily lessons and tests.

The course loosely follows the Bob Jones curriculum as it covers Astronomy, Meteorology, Geology, and Oceanography. Additional supplemental materials on plate tectonics, volcanism, and earthquakes are presented, as they can have a significant impact on our lives in Western Washington. Class time is a mix of multimedia based lectures and hands-on experimentation. On the contrary, it is full of adventure, drama, blood, sweat, and tears! Our state has a great history. All of the events and people that shaped them have had an influence on who we are today.

My goal is to teach students to ask questions, and then how to find the answers to those questions!

I provide a definite structure to the class, but I allow students freedom to choose how to earn their grade. Everyone should expect to spend about 2 hours each week reading/researching. Points are earned by doing reports, papers, creative projects, field trips, and reading books. There will also be 2 to 3 tests and some quizzes.

Students are responsible for buying their text. It is a good outline and basic resource to have.

Classes are centered on discussion, so class participation is a must. Students will be assigned essays (approx. 2-3 each semester) of 3-5 pages in length. Students may also be asked to complete questions and in-class essays.**2:10:00 PM - 3:40:00 PM CLASSES****Musical Theatre Performance: Broadway Revue – Tina Matlock****Grade:** 8 - 12**Class Size:** 10 to 25**Cost:** \$30 monthly, \$50 materials**Text:** None; music will be provided by teacher.**Prerequisites:** None; an audition will take place after class lists go up to determine the vocal range of the students enrolled.**Description:** The focus of this class is to give students an opportunity to perform. Students will work on vocal technique and stage movement/choreography as they put together solo, duet, and ensemble numbers from Broadway musicals that will result in a revue, tailored to the talents of the students enrolled, to be presented as their final project on the second to last day of Legacy. Each student is expected to work on his/her own music at home during the week and memorize each song as it is learned. Due to the nature of this class, weekly attendance is very important.
